

In many ways, 2017 was an extremely busy year for the White Lake Township Police Department. We saw retirements in Patrol, Detective Bureau, Communications, and Records. We hired five new officers, two dispatchers, and a records clerk. The Police Department saw several promotions as well. One Sergeant was promoted to Lieutenant and two Officers were promoted to the rank of Sergeant. We also created an Administrative Sergeant position and had two officers transfer into open Detective Bureau and Student Resource Officer positions respectively. I am excited to say that we are at full staffing levels for the first time in several years!

The Police Department initiated several programs in 2017. We reinstituted the Cadet Program, which gives criminal justice students an opportunity to gain experience in law enforcement while obtaining their college degree. We entered into the Michigan Law Enforcement Accreditation Program through the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police. This accreditation is a progressive and time-proven way of helping our police department calculate and increase our overall improvement through implementation of written directives, policies, and procedures that are conceptually sound and operationally effective. We created the White Lake Police Foundation, a 501(3)c, which will promote drug abstinence and crime prevention amongst children and teens. The foundation will help provide White Lake with programs and events that enrich the community and enhance quality of life for our residents. Last but certainly not least, a committee of officers created a mission statement for the Police Department that embodies our core values.

"It is the Mission of the White Lake Township Police Department to serve our citizens with professionalism, courage, and integrity. To hold the quality of life, preservation of safety, and protection of property in the highest regard."

Finally, we continued our "One Team, One Fight" attitude through our crime fighting strategies and community involvement programs such as—DDACTS (Data-Driven approach to Crime and Traffic Safety), Directed Patrol and Traffic Enforcement Programs, along with our PACT (Police And Community Together), DARE (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) and many other community-based programs. These endeavors have helped to ensure the low crime rate and high quality of life that the citizens of White Lake enjoy.

<u>Crime Analysis</u>

2017 crime in White Lake is again similar to what our region is experiencing, with some notable differences in this year's statistics from last. I am presenting the Oakland County Clemis 2017 statistics for part A and B crimes, in comparison to 2016. In particular, focus is on the decrease in burglaries and larcenies from the prior year. Overall, our crime fighting strategies remain effective; however it is improbable to eradicate crime in its entirety.

The increase in Fraud is a national issue and with the creation of new and innovative ways to steal one's personal identifying information, our township's citizens are at risk. We still offer education and risk assessment at street level and command level to combat this issue.


The charts on page 9 show the total number of accident reports, citations issued, arrests, calls for service, vacant home checks, special attentions, and neighborhood checks performed by the White Lake Township Police Department from 2010 to 2017.

The FBI statistics along with charts showing comparisons between communities in Michigan, as well as nationally. Overall, the White Lake Township crime statistics report an overall downward trend in crime based on data from 18 years with violent crime decreasing and property crime decreasing. Based on this trend, the projected crime rate in White Lake Township for 2018 is expected to be lower than in 2017. The violent crime rate for White Lake Township in 2017 was lower than the national violent crime rate average by 87.87% and the property crime rate in White Lake Township was lower than the national property crime rate average by 58.19%. In 2017 the violent crime rate in White Lake Township was lower than the violent crime rate in Michigan by 82.54% and the property crime rate in White Lake Township was lower than the property crime rate in Michigan by 46.35%.





PART A CRIME COMPARISON FOR WHITE LAKE TWP PD





PART B CRIME COMPARISON FOR WHITE LAKE TWP PD



White Lake Township crime statistics report an overall downward trend in crime based on data from 18 years with violent crime decreasing and property crime decreasing. Based on this trend, the crime rate in White Lake Township for 2018 is expected to be lower than in 2016.

The city violent crime rate for White Lake Township in 2016 was lower than the <u>national violent crime</u> rate average by 87.87% and the city property crime rate in White Lake Township was lower than the <u>national property crime rate</u> average by 58.19%.

In 2016 the city violent crime rate in White Lake Township was lower than the <u>violent crime rate in</u> <u>Michigan</u> by 89.5% and the city property crime rate in White Lake Township was lower than the <u>property crime rate in Michigan</u> by 46.35%.



Compared to U.S. average. (U.S. average equals 100)



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




White Lake Township Michigan National Compared to U.S. average, (U.S. average equals 100)

The **projected** crime rate data displayed above was generated from the trends and crime data available from previous years of actual reported data. In this case, the White Lake Township crime report data for 2018 was projected from 18 years of actual data. The last year of actual available crime data, as reported above, was 2016.

Police Department Training

In 2017, White Lake Township Police Officers completed 693 MCOLES hours of training through Law Enforcement Officers Regional Training Commission. A portion of the training was paid for using LED funds of \$4,509.00 that were received in 2017.

Dispatchers completed a total of 170 hours of training. Subject matter included: Despondent or Suicidal Callers, Active Shooter Training, 911 Ethics and Liability, Survive and Thrive and Homeland Security.

We completed lengthy training of five new Police Officers and two new Dispatchers. All seven of the new employees have met and exceeded expectations of service for the department.

An effort was made to focus training on high risk situations. Officers attended training in areas such as Emergency Vehicle Operations, Defensive Tactics, Deescalation of combative situations, weapons training, and communications.



Social Media

In 2017 our Facebook posts reached 1,383,140 people. This is an increase from last year of 849,546 contacts with the community. We increased our followers from 3,716 at the beginning of the year to 5,304 by December 31, 2017, an increase of 1,588 followers. We were able to make several arrests by posting pictures of suspects.

Officer Gregory Hartner is the D.A.R.E. Officer for the White Lake Township Police Department. Officer Hartner teaches D.A.R.E. to students at Dublin, Oxbow, Lakewood and Brooks Elementary Schools in White Lake Township and Houghton Elementary in Waterford Township. D.A.R.E. was developed in 1982 by the Los Angeles Police Department and stands for: Drug Abuse Resistance and Education.

In use throughout the world, the D.A.R.E. program targets 5th and 7th grade students. A nine-week program, D.A.R.E. teaches the harmful effects of drugs, alcohol and tobacco products and also how to avoid violence. Students who complete the program receive a certificate and a D.A.R.E. t-shirt at a grauation ceremony. The 7th grade D.A.R.E. Program is a continuation of the 5th grade D.A.R.E. Program, and to act as a reinforcement of the information already learned. The 7th grade program focuses on class participation, where students practice real-life situations.

The D.A.R.E. Officer coordinates three major events each year. They are: The Youth Police Academy, The Annual "Shop with a Cop" event, and an annual golf outing that raises money to fund DARE and 5th grade camp.

Police and Community Together P.A.C.T.

In an effort to facilitate expanded communication between the neighborhoods of White Lake and the Police Department, the White Lake Township Police Department has established a program called **Police and Community Together**. This program is designed to enhance communication by providing each neighborhood with a Liaison Officer who will be in direct communication with a member of your neighborhood. The representative from the Police Department and the representative from your neighborhood will have contact on a monthly basis. In doing so, our department will be able to provide up-to-date information for your neighborhood regarding the numerous community programs we have available, safety tips, and topics of concern pertaining to your particular neighborhood. Likewise, this will be a perfect opportunity to express any concerns or other information that is important for our department to know.

The Chief of Police attends the annual meeting of each neighborhood association every year. If he can't be at the meeting, he will designate someone on command staff to attend the meeting.

Conclusion

At the end of 2016 the White Lake Township Police Department experienced the retirement of our Chief of Police, Adam T. Kline. Ushering in a new Chief of Police, Daniel T. Keller in a seamless transition.

Chief Keller graduated from Grand Valley State University with a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice and attended Grand Valley State University's police academy. Chief Keller became a member of the White Lake Township Police Department in March 1998. Keller was promoted to Sergeant in spring 2009 and Lieutenant in 2013. He successfully completed the FBI National Academy, a 10-week leadership program in Quantico, Virginia in 2014.

Keller has been a defensive tactics instructor at the Oakland Police Academy since 2006. He has also served as a defensive tactics instructor at the Law Enforcement Regional Training Academy since 2012. He is a member of the FBI National Academy Associates Michigan Curriculum Committee and is the Huron Valley Community Coalition board president.

The White Lake Township Police Department also experienced the promotions of Sergeant to Lieutenant, a Sergeant to Administrative Sergeant, and promoted two Officers to Sergeants. We saw the retirement of two Officers, one Dispatcher and one Records Clerk. One of the officers that retired was a seasoned investigator. We were able to quickly move the trained SRO Officer into the position and flawlessly ushered in a new School Resource Officer. We hired five new Officers, two new Dispatchers and one new Records Clerk.

The department workforce is continuously attempting to maintain staffing consistent with workloads and community safety. We completed this task with 28 sworn officers.

The White Lake Township Police Department is steadfast in its commitment to the citizens of this community and their quality of life. This is important to us!

We believe that by continuing our enforcement strategies, increasing our community based initiatives and strengthening our relationship with our stake holders, we can accomplish our mission. The White Lake Township Police Department members continue to work at an exhaustive pace all while placing the citizen interest before their own. This is a key component to our recipe of success. Again, we cannot do it alone. Our success can be directly linked to the citizens of White Lake and the support they give our department.
