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The White Lake Township Police Department had an eventful and productive year in 2019. We worked hard to initiate and incorporate new programs and policies for the benefit of our community, we have continued to improve operations and procedures, and finally, we saw a few changes to our staff.

Most of the changes in our staffing came as the result of the retirement of one of our veteran officers, Lieutenant Larry Sheldon in the beginning of 2019. We subsequently promoted Sergeant Matt Ivory to the rank of lieutenant and Officer Ross Wagonmaker was promoted to the rank of sergeant. In addition to the promotions, we hired one new officer and one new clerk in the records department.

Our department focused heavily on introducing new programs in 2019. One of the programs, in which we are very proud to participate, took several years of dedication and hard work. We became one of only sixteen police departments in the state to be accredited through the Michigan Law Enforcement Accreditation Program and the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police. This esteemed accreditation represents the progressive and proven methods our department incorporates to calculate and improve overall performance through the implementation of written directives, policies, and procedures that are conceptually sound and operationally effective. Another program we initiated was the addition of body cameras on all officers and in all patrol vehicles. This was a huge effort that involved creating policies and procedures for saving, reviewing, and disseminating video footage.

Although 2019 brought about new programs, we continued our efforts to improve upon some of the community-based programs that have been introduced in previous years. One of which is the Michigan State Police based Teaching, Educating, and Mentoring (T.E.A.M) School Liaison Program. This year, we created a new, comprehensive workbook for our 5th grade students. We also held multiple fundraising events and received two separate grants through the White Lake Police Foundation, a 501(3)c, which promotes drug abstinence and crime prevention amongst children and teens. Finally, we continued our, "One Team, One Fight" mission through our crime fighting strategies and community involvement programs such as, DDACTS (Data-Driven Approach to Crime and Traffic Safety), Directed Patrol and Traffic Enforcement Programs, PACT (Police and Community Together), the aforementioned T.E.A.M (Teaching, Educating, and Mentoring) and many others. These endeavors have helped to ensure the low crime rate and high quality of life that the citizens of White Lake Township enjoy.



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Officer of the Year

Sergeant Matthew Silverthorn

Matthew Silverthorn graduated from Central Michigan University in 2015 where he earned a Master's Degree in Public Administration. Sergeant Silverthorn also holds a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice from Ferris State University and an Associate's Degree in Criminal Justice from Washtenaw Community College. He also graduated from the Northwestern University School of Police Staff and Command in 2013.

Sergeant Silverthorn served in the U.S. Army as an Air Assault trained Cavalry Scout and

Intelligence Analyst as a member of the 10^{Th} Mountain Division. After graduating from the Washtenaw County Police academy he worked as a part-time Police Officer for one year for the City of Howell. He began his career with WLTPD in 1996.

During his career at WLTPD, he has held the positions of Patrol Officer, Detective, Patrol Sergeant, and Administrative Sergeant. He has also performed several other duties for WLTPD, such as Field Training Officer, Special Response Team, Evidence Technician, Property Room Manager, Union President and Vice President, and other various duties.

Sergeant Silverthorn is an active member of community and participates

in several community service events. He serves on the Board of Directors of the Joe Kocur Foundation for Children that has raised over a million dollars for charities in the Lakes Area. He created and manages a public service scholarship at Lakeland High School which has provided over \$50,000 in scholarships. He also works with local and state Special Olympics at various events. He recently received a Community Service Award from FOP 128 Lodge for his community efforts.

In late 2017, WLTPD created the Administrative Sergeant position with the goal of a complete restructuring and redesign of department policies and training, and acquiring accreditation with MACP. Sergeant Silverthorn has served as the WLTPD Administrative Sergeant since the inception of the position. The department purchased and implemented the PowerDMS system to manage internal policies and training. Sergeant Silverthorn has ensured that the department's policies and procedures were updated and issued in 2018 to either meet or exceed the MACP Accreditation standards.



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2019 No Shave November

In honor of "No Shave November," police grew out their beards as part of a fundraising campaign to support a local White Lake family in need. Officers donated to participate, and paper beards were sold to support the cause. It was the third year the department has adopted a family for the holidays.

Each year we choose a White Lake family who is in financial hardship due to a child's medical bills. This year we raised almost \$3,000. 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Crime Analysis

Reported crime in White Lake Township for 2019, is similar to what our region is experiencing, with some notable differences in this year's statistics from last. I am presenting the Oakland County Clemis 2019 statistics for part A and B crimes, in comparison to 2018. In particular, focus is on the decrease in burglaries and larcenies from the prior year. Overall, our crime fighting strategies remain effective; however it is improbable to eradicate crime in its entirety.

The increase in fraud and identity theft is a national issue and with the creation of new and innovative ways to steal personal identifying information, our township's citizens need to remain vigilant. We continue to offer education and risk assessment at street level and command level to combat this issue.

The charts on page 10 show the total number of accident reports, citations issued, arrests, calls for service, vacant home checks, special attentions, and neighborhood checks performed by the White Lake Township Police Department from 2010 to 2019.

The FBI statistics (page 8) along with charts show comparisons between communities in Michigan, as well as nationally. Overall, the reported crime in White Lake Township, demonstrate a downward trend in crime based on data from 19 years with violent crime decreasing and property crime decreasing. Based on this trend, the projected crime rate in White Lake Township for 2020 is expected to be lower than in 2019. The violent crime rate for White Lake Township in 2016 (last recorded data) was lower than the national violent crime rate average by 87.87% and the property crime rate in White Lake Township was lower than the national property crime rate average by 58.19%. In 2016 (last recorded data) the violent crime rate in White Lake Township was lower than the violent crime rate in Michigan by 82.54% and the property crime rate in White Lake Township was lower than the property crime rate in Michigan by 46.35%.

Marijuana was decriminalized in Michigan beginning in 2019. As a result, arrest for violations of the control substance act decreased dramatically.


The amount of retail fraud complaints have increased as more businesses moved into the township. As a department, we have focused on arresting and prosecuting retail fraud offenders to discourage reoffence.



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FBI Crime Statistics


White Lake Property Crime Index



Crime Index corresponds to incidents per 100,000 inhabitants




White Lake Violent Crime Index

White Lake 2020 Crime (Projected)







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






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Police Department Training

In 2019, White Lake Township Police Officers completed a large amount of their training through Oakland Community College, which was paid for using Law Enforcement Distribution funds of \$4,552.20. A portion of the police department budget was also used for training outside of OCC.

Dispatchers completed a total of 192 hours of training. Subject matter included: Emergency Telecommunicator Course, Child Callers, Domestic Violence, Homeland Security, Ethics and Liability, Despondent or Suicidal Callers, Emergency Fire Dispatch, Customer Service, Criminal Law, Active Shooters, and the Communications Training Officer Program.

An effort was made to focus training on high risk situations. Officers attended training in areas such as Traffic Stop Tactics, Defensive Tactics, De-escalation Training, Weapons training, and Communications. In 2018 and 2019, training was added to address managing mental health crises. As a result, data in 2019 showed that the number of situations where physical action was required in mental health crisis situations was significantly reduced.

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TIA Award



The TIA is the organization that administers grant money for the Operating While Intoxicated and Distracted Driving grants. White Lake Township Police Department was the only agency in the state to be recognized for their efforts in the area of drunk driving enforcement and distracted driving enforcement. In 2019, your White Lake Township police officers worked an additional 348 hours of traffic enforcement because of the grant money provided. During those grant hours, officers made 439 traffic stops, which resulted in 256 citations, 32 arrests for operating while intoxicated, 37 misdemeanor arrests, and 4 felony arrests. The department is proud to have received this award and will be displaying it for the public. We are happy to continue working for you to keep the citizens of White Lake safe, both at home and on the go.




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Social Media

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Citizens Academy

The White Lake Township Police Department, in conjunction with the Township Board of Trustees and Township Fire Department, created the White Lake Citizens' Academy in 2004. The Citizens' Academy is a 30-hour block of instruction provided to

approximately 25 citizens per class, twice per year. During the 13-week program, citizens receive hands-on instruction in the following areas:
